Diamond Open Access: In this model, journals are free to both readers and authors. Funding typically comes from institutional support, government grants, or other non-commercial sources. When implementing an open access policy, journals should consider factors such as sustainable funding models, copyright and licensing options, and compliance with relevant open access mandates from funding agencies or institutions.
